



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

WFN Recycling Guide

Wahnapitae First Nation's Recycling Guide



Recycling doesn't just end at the curb...that's just the beginning.

At one time, WFN did not have any recycling, now that we do, we need to ensure we do it RIGHT. Thanks to our stream sorting system, all recyclables go in the blue box together and the recycling centre handles all the sorting. However, it is up to us to follow some simple rules. One of the rules is to place your **recyclable** items loosely in your bluebox. This allows our Waste Division Technicians (Paul and Ed) to leave behind non-recyclable items so that you recognize what can and cannot be recycled. Loose items also allow the Recycling Centre to process only recyclable items in an efficient manner. The system requires loose, not bagged material. Blue box materials go through a series of high speed conveyor belts where magnets, gravity and people re-direct sorted loose material into specific categories which are then bundled and shipped to buyers around the world!

Every time you place loose materials in your recycling container you accomplish at least three good deeds for the community:

1. You are diverting waste from our landfill and extending its life.
2. You are ensuring materials such as aluminum and paper that have many lives can be used and reused to their fullest.
3. You are helping to save energy!

We have included a sticker that you can place on your **garbage** can to help you remember what goes in the blue box. We will also be placing small stickers on any items you place in the blue box that **ARE NOT** recyclable or **ARE NOT** ready to be recycled (eg. not clean out). These items will be left behind so you know that they are not recyclable or that they require further attention.

WFN has hired two Waste Division Technicians to complete the outside recycling and garbage pickup as well as to monitor the landfill. The WFN Waste Division Technicians have developed **RECYCLING INCENTIVE AWARDS** in an effort to recognize the commitment and dedication of the WFN community to recycling and waste diversion programs! We are watching who is recycling and who is doing GREAT at it! Look out for our awards presentation at the 2012 Open House on May 5, 2012. Wahnsipitae First Nation's Composting Guide



Composting doesn't just end at the curb...that's just the beginning.

Organic food scraps and food soiled paper products are a RESOURCE...NOT A WASTE!

At one time, WFN did not have any composting initiatives, now that we do, we need to ensure we do it RIGHT. Thanks to the large interest of many community members during the 2012 Open House, all residents of Wahnsipitae First Nation will be provided a green cart and kitchen collector in order to promote composting! However, it is up to us to follow some simple rules. One of the most important rules is to ensure that bio-degradable bags are used. This allows our Waste Diversion Technicians (Paul and Ed) to simply add of the compostable material to the organic composting pad situated at the landfill and not have to sort out the non-degradable plastic bags.

Every time you place organic material in your green cart you accomplish at least three good deeds for the community:

1. You are diverting waste from our landfill and extending its life.
2. You are ensuring materials such as aluminum and paper that have many lives can be used and reused to their fullest.
3. You are helping to save energy!

Lots of people wonder about the benefits of composting. Here are a few examples:

1. It's free and renewable!
2. Improves and replenishes soils.
3. Protects ecosystems, enhances germination of trees and fuel plant growth.
4. It's environmentally friendly!

We have included a sticker that you can place on your garbage can to help you remember what goes in the green cart. In order to ensure that there are no contaminating materials in our composting pad, we will also be placing small stickers on your green cart when non-compostable items are found during outside collection. Households that exceed 2 stickers on their green cart will be provided a written notice and will be asked to meet with our Waste Diversion Technicians to clarify what can be composted.

WFN has hired two Waste Diversion Technicians to complete the curbside composting pickup on Tuesday and Thursday of every week. Community Members will also have the opportunity to personally drop off their composting during the landfill operating hours. The WFN Waste Diversion Technicians have developed a composting pad at the landfill to promote personal gardens, flower beds etc. Community members will have the opportunity to use the composting material at the landfill site for personal use. We ask that you please contact our Waste Diversion Technicians for assistance. If you have any questions or concerns, please talk to Ed or Paul.

Wahnapiitae First Nation Waste Diversion Regulations

Adopted by Band Council Motion # _____
At the Chief and Council Meeting of: _____

1.0 INTRODUCTION

- 1.1 Wahnapiitae First Nation implemented Waste Disposal and Landfill Site Regulations on February 4, 2008 through Band Council Motion # 03/10. These regulations have been integrated into these WFN Waste Diversion Regulations.
- 1.2 Wahnapiitae First Nation recognizes the importance of environmental stewardship and believes that proper environmental management and mitigation are integral to the success of the community.
- 1.3 Wahnapiitae First Nation has developed a Waste Diversion Strategy to guide the effective disposal of generated waste in the spirit of environmental stewardship and in hopes of extending the life of the landfill.
- 1.4 Wahnapiitae First Nation regulates waste diversion activities within the Wahnapiitae First Nation including the collection, removal and disposal of household waste, recyclables, and organic waste within the Wahnapiitae First Nation in order to support goals and objectives identified within the Waste Diversion Strategy.
- 1.5 Wahnapiitae First Nation has entered into a Recyclables' Acceptance Agreement with the City of Greater Sudbury and must abide by all recycling regulations associated with the City of Greater Sudbury and identifies cost per tonnage.
- 1.6 No individual shall throw, place or deposit any solid waste on any private property, or any Band owned property within the Wahnapiitae First Nation, unless designated as at specific landfill sites. Illegal dumping will be subject to enforcement through these regulations.

2.0 DEFINITIONS

Recyclables: *Waste materials that can be diverted to a Recycling Centre, includes; Corrugated cardboard and pizza boxes, Box board, Newspaper, magazines, catalogues and junk mail, Household Paper, Plastics, (#1, #2, #4, #5, and #6), Plastic bags, Clear and coloured glass bottles and jars, Milk and juice containers/cartons, Egg cartons, Aluminum and steel cans, aluminum foil, pie plates and trays, Empty paint cans and aerosol cans, and cardboard cans.*

Household Waste: *Includes garbage, liquid and semi-liquid substances, land-fill and scrap of all kinds and combination of any of the foregoing that are not commercial waste, recyclable, or compostable*

Kitchen Organics: *Includes; all food items such as fruits and vegetables, meats and fish products/bones, cooled grease and fats, sauces and gravy, dairy products, breads and grains, baked goods and ingredients, pasta and rice, eggs and eggshells, nuts and shells, coffee grounds/filters/tea bags, as well as Non-Recyclable Paper Products including muffin paper cups, freezer and waxed paper, tissues/napkins/paper towels, paper plates/cups/takeout containers, waxed cardboard, ice cream cartons, sugar/ flour/potato/popcorn bags, as well as other compostable materials such as household plants and soil.*

Curbside Collection: *Collection, handling, transportation, storage or transfer of household waste and/or kitchen organics collected at residential curbsides by the Wahnapiitae First Nation's Waste Diversion Technicians*

Residential: *Establishments such as homes or apartment buildings, registered with Wahnapiitae First Nation*

Business/Commercial: *Means waste from:*

- a) *an enterprise or activity involving warehousing, storage or industrial, manufacturing or commercial processes or operations*
- b) *research or an experimental enterprise or activity*
- c) *an enterprise or activity to which clause (a) would apply if the enterprise or activity were carried on for profit,*
- d) *clinics that provide medical diagnosis or treatment,*
- e) *schools, laboratories or hospitals, or*
- f) *a facility or vehicle owned or operated by a reserve*

Business Owner: *Any Wahnapiitae First Nation Band Member who owns and operates an on-reserve commercial entity.*

3.0 RESIDENTIAL SERVICES

- 3.1 Wahnapiitae First Nation will provide a system for the weekly curb-side collection of recycling, kitchen organics and house hold waste to all residents.
- 3.2 The Wahnapiitae First Nation will provide monitored access to the Wahnapiitae First Nation landfill site during designated hours in order to enhance environmental monitoring and protection initiatives.

- One punch card is allowed per campground owner.
- Each number on the punch card entitles the owner to 1 bag of household garbage.
- This punch card only be used by the business owner or the individual designated on this punch card.
- This punch card can be used until all numbers have been punched (there is no expiry date).
- The punch card must be shown to the landfill attendant at EVERY visit to be granted access to the landfill site.
- If this punch card is lost or stolen, the business owner must purchase a new card at full price.
- There will be a \$25.00 tipping fee on truckloads (1/2 tonne truck) coming to the landfill full of waste that is not household waste.

WFN Waste Audit – September 2012

- Averaged our set out evaluations for one month, to give us weekly average.
- 32 households generate 72 bags of garbage weekly. 2.25/bags per household/week
- Aim to capture 25% of 72 bags = 18 bags
- Randomly choose 18 bags after we picked up all the curbside waste.






