- □ First Nations people have used and occupied the lands for thousands of years.
- Areas of cultural and spiritual significance must to be identified, protected and/or withdrawn from areas of staking and exploration for the preservation of culture and for future generations.

Provisional: Area of provisional protection

13. (1) If there is no community based land use plan for an area in the Far North, a First Nation may request that the Minister make an order designating the area as an area of provisional protection.

Order

(2) At the request of a First Nation under subsection (1) or on his or her own initiative, the Minister may make the order described in that subsection if the Minister is of the opinion that the prescribed criteria have been met.

Effect of order

(3) An order designating an area as an area of provisional protection shall specify the developments, land uses and activities that are not permitted in the area, subject to the restriction that no person shall carry on any of the developments, land uses and activities described in any of paragraphs 2 to 6 of subsection 14 (2) in the area.

Request to withdraw land from mining staking

(4) If the Minister makes an order under subsection (2) with respect to an area, the Minister shall request the Minister of Northern Development, Mines and Forestry to make an order under the *Mining Act withdrawing the area* from staking under that Act.

Non-application of Environmental Assessment Act

(5) For greater certainty, the designation of an area as an area of provisional protection is not an undertaking as defined in the *Environmental Assessment Act*.

Termination of order

(6) An order that designates an area as an area of provisional protection ceases to have any effect if a community based land use plan takes effect for the area.





Protected areas

- (2) No person shall carry on any of the following developments, land uses and activities in a protected area:
- Prospecting, mining claim staking or mineral exploration.
- 2. Opening a mine in the prescribed circumstances.
- 3. Commercial timber harvest.
- 4. Oil and gas exploration or production.
- 5. Constructing an electrical generation facility that uses wind or water as a source unless a person issues an authorization for the construction under an Act administered by the Minister because the person is of the opinion that the construction is incidental or complementary to land use or land use activities that are not prohibited under paragraph 1, 2, 3, 4 or 6.

Do hereby resolve:

WHEREAS: the Kashechewan First Nation wants to preserve the dignity of the burial site of Nick Lazarus (Child), members of Kashechewan.

WHEREAS: the Kashechewan First Nation wants to set aside an area of land with the expressed intention of protecting the interment rights of Nick Lazarus (Child) and associated grave goods in accordance with Omushkego practices, spirituality and cultural affinities of Kashechewan First Nation within traditional and ancestral territory.

WHEREAS: the Kashechewan First Nation wants to ensure that the burial site Nick Lazarus (Child) are treated with respect and wants to protect and preserve the burial site from commercial, industrial, agricultural, residential or other development.

WHEREAS: No person shall interfere with the burial site of Nick Lazarus (Child) and associated grave goods or otherwise wilfully and unlawfully disturb the interment rights.

WHEREAS: for the security, protection and preservation of the burial site Nick Lazarus (Child). Kashechewan First Nation has designated a buffer zone surrounding the burial site that is consistent with existing physical and historical evidence and that protects all the physical and cultural expressions of the burial site.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED: that no disturbance will be allowed and that no operation of a drill, vehicle, equipment, machine, device or anything capable of disturbing the surface of the ground and under the ground of the removal of any material for exploration or staking will be allowed within the five hundred (500) meter buffer zone.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED: that the Kashechewan First Nation engaging working with the Ministry of Northern Development and Mines to establish and designate a buffer zone of five hundred (500) meters surrounding the burial site of Nick Lazarus (Child) located on the GIS coordinates UTM 393250 mE 5630120 mN within the Kah_wha_chi_chek_koo_sit_too_wuk area on Stooping River within our traditional and ancestral homelands and is consistent with existing physical and historical evidence with the expressed intention of protecting and preserving the physical and cultural integrity of the burial site.

SECTION 35, THE MINING ACT, R.S.O. 1990

ORDER NO. W-P-75/14

The SURFACE RIGHTS and MINING RIGHTS of the areas outlined in red on the attached sketches. situated in BMA 518 814 (G-5274) and BMA 525 814 (G-5272), in the Porcupine Mining Division, containing 48 hectares more or less, are hereby WITHDRAWN from prospecting, staking out, sale or lease.

These areas are WITHDRAWN for reasons of cultural, ecological or other sensitive nature,

Saving, excepting and reserving hereto and herefrom, all other lands patented, sold, leased or otherwise alienated by the Crown at the date of this Order.

Any alienated lands lying within the limits of this withdrawn area that revert to the Crown subsequent to the date of this Order will automatically be considered to be withdrawn as part of this Order.







Burial Site 16 hectors withdrawal by KFN and MNDM Claims Mapidentified withdrawal order

Large Scale Protection Areas

Mushkegowuk territory is mostly wetland, peat, and muskeg, all of which provide prime lands for vegetation (e.g., berries, important herbs) and wildlife habitat along rivers, lakes, and coastal lines.


Protection of these areas is important.





Lands & Resources

- L&R provides strategic to the Chiefs and Councils with regards to the conservation, protection, management and development of the natural resources within the KFN traditional territory
- The major areas of focus are:
 - Provisional and Protection
 - Forestry Development
 - Land Use Planning
 - Elders Advisory Services
 - Focus on Mining and Mineral ResourcesDevelopment
 - Potential Resources Economic Development
 - Historical Maps with Historical and current data

What was the Values Collection Project?

- □ The collection of Traditional Values project came about as a response to the Modernization of Ontario's Mining Act (2009)
- KFN Council and Land Use Planning Coordinator worked together develop a project that would identify culturally and spiritually significant/sacred values in the territory and identify use and occupancy
- Capture our history and occupancy of lands and waters, and for our youth, so we won't lose the history of our Elder's stories, experiences, language and indigenous place names of our rivers, lakes etc.
- Education tool for students and educators for knowledge of our ancestral and traditional lands. Document and preserve information of our elders and harvesters.

 Interviews were scheduled and conducted at either the LUP office or in homes... where ever the interviewee was most comfortable.







- Regular updates were given at meetings and information to members through community newsletters
- Discussing with Elders and Youth on withdrawal of burial sites and identifying protected areas and importance of documenting our homelands









Outcomes

- The project has gathered valuable First
 Nation Use and Occupancy data that
 must be protected
- Values are being shared with MNDM and mining industry for an open dialogue about areas of protection during the Application for Exploration phase of Mining Cycle
- Withdrawals of cultural areas of significance and sacred sites from future staking are being done through Section 35 of the Mining Act

Treaty Rights

Provincial Parks and Conservation Reserves Act, 2006:

Existing aboriginal or treaty rights

4. Nothing in this Act shall be construed so as to abrogate or derogate from the protection provided for the existing aboriginal and treaty rights of the aboriginal peoples of Canada as recognized and affirmed in section 35 of the *Constitution Act*, 1982. 2006, c. 12, s. 4.


Treaty rights: The specific rights of the Aboriginal peoples embodied in the treaties they entered into with a Crown government, initially Britain and after confederation, Canada. They may address matters such as the creation of reserves and the rights of Aboriginal communities to hunt and fish. Existing treaty rights are recognized and affirmed by Section 35 (1) of the Constitution Act, 1982. Value: A specific attribute or feature (Aboriginal, cultural, ecological or recreational), or ecological function within a protected area that may require additional/ special consideration during the management planning process and subsequent management. Value of conservation interest (VCI): Those values considered to be most significant to a protected area and are often associated with why the protected area was established and/or how the protected area contributes to the protected areas system and the maintenance of ecological integrity.

"If it is discovered that Aboriginal or treaty rights may be affected, MNR has a legal duty to consult and, if appropriate, make accommodations so communities can continue to exercise their rights that have been affirmed in the Constitution Act." http://www.ontario.ca/document/ontarios-protected-areas-planning-manual

Kashechewan First Nation planning areas of interested to date.

This is indentified and worked on through intensive interviews and audio recordings with Elders, harvesters and active youth out in the lands.

Approximate size of planning area is 39,570 hectares



Challenges

- □ The length of time to negotiate and secure a funding agreement
- Under-estimated the amount of training that was required
- Project ended before all communities had completed their data collection and land use plan
- □ Interviewing out-of-town Elders and members
- Low water levels and access to inland burial and sacred sites
- Cash flow and funds available within KFN

Moving Forward

- We are currently working together with Mushkegowuk Land Use
 Planners, MNRF, and MNDM for technical advise and resources to move forward
- Representatives from community, e.g. Elders Advisory Committee,
 Joint Planning Team, and Youth member
- The Terms of Reference and Scope are currently being discussed. Some of the scope items include:
 - The Data Sharing Protocol ended with the completion of the Values Collection project
 - Establishing standard prescriptions for the protection of Values across the Territory
 - The collection and sharing of information, building understandings concerning mining exploration and development including policies, regulations, protocols, and best practices.
- Community information sessions and input and ratification of "Terms of reference and Land Use plan

Moving Forward (con't)

- Map and document historical and present data of "Use of Land"Youth and people to learn and know First Nation Peoples
 - occupancy of Turtle Island
- Education tool and history for education institutions
- ☐ Indigenous places names e.g. Rivers, lakes, sacred places,
